Tim began conducting in his teens and went on to read Music and French at the University of Exeter. He studied violin with Mary Eade, composition with Joe Duddell and specialised in Musical Direction with lan Mitchell. Subsequent to his graduation with a double first-class degree, he has conducted a wide variety of vocal and instrumental ensembles and has recently participated in the internationally recognised George Hurst Conductor's Course at Sherborne Summer School of Music, studying with Rodolfo Saglimbeni, Denise Ham and Dominic Grier. Tim particularly enjoys working with ensembles of varying degrees of experience and is a firm believer that classical music should be made as accessible as possible to both performers and the wider audience. In addition to the Dunsford Singers, Tim is Musical Director of the Exeter University Symphony Orchestra, the Dartmouth Orchestra, Chagford Singers, orchestra+ (the South West's first LGBT symphony orchestra) and the EX4 Chamber Orchestra, which he founded in August 2015.

Recent podium highights have included Beethoven's 2nd, 5th and 6th symphonies; Sibelius' 2nd and 5th symphonies and concertante works by Krommer, Rachmaninoff, Weber, Chopin and Bruch. Recent choral conducting highlights have included performances of Puccini's Messa di Gloria, Vivaldi's Gloria, Haydn's Missa in Agustiis and Rutter's Requiem.

Tim is delighted to have been the Dunsford Singers' Musical director for very nearly three years. During this time the choir has tackled a diverse programme of classical and modern works. Last summer saw us singing a selection of famous European sacred music alongside Abba and *The Greatest Showman* (not to mention our percussive efforts to create rain in Toto's *Africa!*)

Schubert Mass in G

At a time when the rest of Europe was caught up in Napoleon's defeat at Waterloo, Franz Peter Schubert was quietly writing dozens of compositions. Astonishingly, this beautiful piece was composed in less than a week, in March 1815, when he was just eighteen years old. It has been described as 'the gentlest of masses, permeated with a kind of sweetness rare in mass settings' (Craig Smith). Schubert's life was short (he died aged thirty one) and his fame largely arrived posthumously. He lived in relative obscurity, supported and encouraged by a close circle of family, friends and admirers. This particular Mass was not to be published until decades after his death. It was intended for performance in his parish church in Liechtenthal, a suburb of Vienna. It is an unpretentious composition but with passages of soaring lyricism, particullarly in the Kyrie and Benedictus. The weighty opening of the Sanctus is followed by a lively, vigorous fugue. The Gloria offers a lyrical central section framed by music of great fire. The *Credo* opens and closes guietly with the Crucifixus section providing more force. The Agnus Dei, with its choral pleas interspersing the soloists' phrases, brings the work to a peaceful conclusion.

We have chosen to sing the Mass using the Germanic Latin pronunciation familiar to Schubert and his audiences.

This spirited carol first appeared in *Pia Cantiones*, a collection of Scandinavian songs, in 1581. The tune is probably medieval in origin. The words urge us: *Rejoice! Rejoice, for Christ is born of Mary. A time of Grace is upon us, so let us sing joyfully! God has become man; the world is renewed; light is upon us; salvation has been found! Let us sing in brightness, blessing our Lord and greeting our King!*

Reading: Winter by John Clare Helen Harding

Northern Lights: Ola Gjielo

In this ravishing, unaccompanied choral piece the Norwegian composer sets the scene for Winter. Looking out from an attic window, at Christmas 2007, over a wintery lake under the stars, Gjielo was struck by how 'a terrible beauty' is reflected in the Northern Lights - how its powerful, electrical power must have both mesmerised and terrified people of the past. He uses the Latin text from *The Song of Solomon: Thou art beautiful, my love, sweet and comely as Jerusalem, terrible as an army set in array. Turn away thine eyes from me, for they have made me flee away.*

O Holy Night: Adolphe Adam/ Placide Cappeau

Voted Classic FM's most popular Christmas song we just had to include this! It dates from 1847, using lyrics from a French poem. It has been recorded by singers ranging from Nat King Cole to Mariah Carey and even the operatic tenor, Andrea Bocelli. With its sweeping melody and powerful, heart-piercing chorus we hope it makes your spine tingle. Our soloists are Jo Jenkin and Hazel Linney.

I Wonder as I Wander: Carl Rutti

In 1933 the American folklorist John Jacob Miles heard a little girl singing in the Appalachian Mountains. He collected the lyrical and melodic fragments and extended them into a three verse song. In this new melody, the Swedish composer Carl Rutti conjures up an atmospheric sense of the great outdoors and the drama of the Nativity. He combines English choral traditions with a jazzy, bluesy feel, to stunning effect.
